



Sadly Missed, one of our Club's Founders and First President LOU SOPER

For nearly two years we have been missing Lou Soper. No one knew what happened to him because he

did not answer calls or e-mails. Well, the mystery is now sadly solved: Lou passed away in his sleep this past March 22 at age 83. Lou's daughter, Dawn Halverson, informed me that there will be a memorial service for Lou on Saturday, June 16 at 11:00 a.m. (see below). Some of you will be on your way to Las Vegas for the Convention at that time, but Dawn hopes that those people



might come and attend the memorial before continuing on to Las Vegas.

Here is some of what Dawn Halverson wrote in an email: Lou is survived by five children, 3 grandchildren, 2 greatgrandchildren, two sisters, one aunt and

many, many friends. His wife Mary predeceased him on May 15, 2006. (His wife Mary Casey, whom many of you knew, passed away in the early days of our present club.) Lou was one of the five founders of the SF Accordion Club and he will be greatly missed. He was a wonderful musician and friend to all.

The family has requested that the Accordion Club pay honor to Lou during his Celebration of Life service to be held on Saturday, June 16, 2007 at 11:00 a.m. at Fremont Chapel of the Roses, 1940 Peralta Blvd., Fremont, CA. A reception will follow immediately at the same location. More about Lou Soper . . .

Kris Nelson shared with me an article he wrote about Lou a few years back. Here are some excerpts.

Usually when I first meet people I judge them by the way they speak, the way they dress, and their attitude.

You know, all the things that go into a first impression. I'd like to think that most of us do this. But, what happens when you're all musicians? Well, here's what happened to me.

In 1996, Jim Boggio (my first instructor) invited me to a dinner Sunday evening,

after the Cotati Accordion Festival. The dinner was in honor of Art Van Damme. After dinner a number of talented players got up and performed, each one as talented as the next. What a treat! I figured that after dinner everyone would sit around and talk, and then wander off after saying their "good nights." I should have known that these accordion folks had more fun than that!

The last performer of the evening was a fellow named Lou Soper. I didn't know Lou or what to expect, except that if he was one of Jim Boggio's buddies, he had to know something ... right?

.... Lou stood about 5'7", with white hair and gold-framed glasses, dressed "dressy casual" in his blazer. He appeared to be one of the senior players there that night. I guessed him to be about the same age as my dad (late 60's). There was also something in the way he conducted himself (maybe it was the way he was joking with Boggio) that told me that we were gonna have some fun, and that fun was gonna start soon. He got up and strapped on his accordion, a big smile on his face, and he started into



He began with light conversation interspersed with quick chord "riffs." It was a mixture of conversation and comedy, as Lou gently ribbed the senior "players" in the audience (especially Boggio) and introduced himself to the rest of us. Then Lou broke into his first number, and I was

his set.

launched into a whole new world of accordion music.

Lou Soper plays an accordion with a "full sound" style. When you first hear him play, his style makes a strong impression. No, there's no mistaking that sound for anyone else's. Once you've heard it you know Lou has his own way of playing the accordion. Hang on, because it's a really fun ride! Lou's first



teacher was
George Cailotto
who taught Lou
enough basics so
he could continue
learning on his own
after studying with
Cailotto for a year.

In 1998 I was able to corner Lou for about 45 minutes and interview him about his life, his music and his hopes for the future of the accordion. Lou was born in Saginaw, MI and began playing accordion in 1938 at

the age of 15. After a stint in the Navy, Lou lived in Detroit, then moved to Fargo, ND in the late 1950's. He moved to California in 1982.

Lou describes his playing by saying that he presents a total package, a full sound on the accordion, his personality/ability to interact with the audience, and a concept to each set that he plays.

When asked what the highlights of his career have been, Lou cites four events: Co-founding the Bay Area Accordion Club (now the SF Accordion Club); helping to start the Cotati accordion Festival; being a featured performer at Art Van Damme's 75th birth-



day party; and playing a farewell tribute to his buddy Jim Boggio, at Jim's funeral.

Lou wrote down his theories of chord construction into a series of two self-published instructional books: Lou Soper's Easy Musical Chord Retention Method, Volumes One and Two.

On February 15, 1999 The Accordion Club of the Redwoods honored Lou Soper with the ACR Lifetime Achievement Award. It was the first award of this kind given by the ACR.

So there you have it. That's my buddy, Lou "Mister Chords" Soper.

Note from Editor: Kris Nelson's excellent article is much longer than this. It goes on about Lou's style of music and his idea of the future of the accordion. I've tried to extract the highlights. Thank you, Kris, for sharing this with us.




