
Telmo also lugged stuff into and out of the kitchen, and stayed till the very end helping us take down deco-

Although we missed having Maestro Galla-Rini at the camp with us this year, we loved having our own Joe Smiell as one of the conductors and arrangers. Joan Cochran Sommers was the other conductor, and both of them worked us hard! The concert was a big success, and contained more ensemble numbers (perhaps too many) than we have ever done before: In A Persian Market, American Folk Rhapsody, Medley from My Fair Lady and Il Bersaglieri (Italian polka), all conducted and arranged by Joe Smiell. Joan Sommers conducted Omaggio a Pietro (arr. Galla-Rini), Granada (arr. Sommers), Syncopated Clock (Arr. Sommers), Highlights from Showboat (arr. Sommers). Then a more brave group also took on the challenge of a very long Gerschwin medley (arr. Sommers) and Sleeping Beauty Waltz (arr. Galla-Rini).

Some fascinating workshops were also presented by Joe, Joan, Father Joe Baccellieri, Stella Allison and Esther Lanting, on various topics. Besides the everpopular Dance Night on Wednesday, there were at least two parties going on every night, esp. in the "French Ouarter."



Faithe Deffner's Article on Myron Floren's Memorial Service

An emotional memorial tribute "In loving remembrance of Myron Floren" took place on August 6 at the Ascension Lutheran Church in Rancho Palos Verdes, CA, where the family has wor-

shipped since the mid-60's. Myron died at home on July 23, 2005 at the age of 85.

A near life-size picture of Myron, youthful grin on his face and accordion in his arms, stood near the pulpit, looking out at family and friends who had assembled for this final farewell. Remembering the biblical enjoinder to "make a joyful noise unto the Lord," the Rev. Dr. Jan L. Womer told the congregants that this had been Myron's lifetime work.

Floren's personal warmth, humility and gentleness were eulo-

gized by his daughter Holly Floren; his son-in-law Bob Burgess; Herb Skoog of the New Braunfels, TX festival where Myron was an annual attraction for the past 34 years; and his longtime friend and agent Warren Bills.

Myron himself provided the music for the memorial from among the hundreds of titles he recorded over the years: Fughetta, Sentimental Journey, How Great Thou Art, The Lost Chord, and Battle Hymn of the Republic. Each song was a poignant punctuation to prayers, scriptures and blessings in the touching service. Rev. Womer spoke of Myron's lifetime spent in delighting audiences, noting that "His name brings a smile to people's faces. The heavenly choir sings even more beautifully today because there is a new musician in their ranks."

As it was throughout Myron's lifetime, his accordion was predominant in the memorial service, capturing the essence of the consummate musician cited by Rev. Womer for his "life with purpose."

When the service concluded, Floren's youngest daughter Heidi gathered several necklaces of beautiful purple orchids, the traditional Hawaiian lei. She put one on her mother, Berdyne, on each of her four sisters, Randee, Kristie, Robin and Holly, and herself, to wear as a symbol of farewell to their loved one, in the style of the Islands where the family frequently vacationed.

A repast for family and friends followed in the church's anteroom. Here, the walls were covered with lifetime photos—Myron and the Welk Orchestra and in appearances during an iconic career as an entertainer, which spanned more than six decades—with the familiar accordion in his arms. The background music was Myron playing, while family and friends reminisced about this always—modest gentle man who was bigger than life. In the words of Rev. Womer, "We shall not look upon his like again."

regarding the article in the July newsletter about **Pietro Deiro's accordion**: "I was delighted to receive the July 2005 issue of the SFAC newsletter and read the fascinating article about Pietro Deiro's accordion. I had no idea that **Vince Cirelli** was the repairman who had restored that historic and beautiful instrument!

"For the record: It was not I who convinced Sandra (Deiro) Cattani (Pietro's granddaughter) to donate her accordion to Helmi Harrington's "A World of Accordions" Museum in Superior, Wisconsin; it was Pietro's nephew Count Guido Roberto Deiro. Guido Jr. commissioned me to pick up Pietro's 1917 accordion from Ms. Cattani and also pick up Guido's 1926 accordion (both built by SF-based Guerrini Accordion Co.) and deliver them to Helmi's museum. All I did was deliver the instruments, present a workshop and recital at the museum and take the photos...."

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A Compact Bass Notation Robert L. Smith

I often transcribe music for my own use. A common problem with longer pieces is that the number of pages may exceed the number that can be held easily on a stand. In order to reduce the number of pages and page turns, I often resort to using "legal" sized paper (8 ½ inches by 14 inches). That helps, but only up to a point. The next step is to eliminate the bass staff and replace it with a simple notation for the chords, like we often see in "fake book" pieces. When the piece is simple, that is adequate. But what if we need more extensive documentation? The next step up is to specify the bass notes separately from the chords. Some possibilities come to mind almost immediately.

One method is to indicate the bass notes with a preceding slash. Another is to use lower case letters to specify the bass notes. Or, you could use capital letters for the bass notes and lower case letters for the chords.

However, sometimes the above methods are inadequate. A few years ago I decided to transcribe "Wedding of the Winds" as arranged by Joe Smiell. The first three measures in standard notation are shown in Figure 1. Notice



that both the bass and chords are held simultaneously. In addition, in the first half of the measure the bass-chord combination is held for the time of three eighth notes, but in the second half the combination appears three times each for the time of an eighth note each time. This is sufficiently complicated that it takes more than one line to compress the bass clef. It can be done with two lines, as shown in Figure 2. The underline extensions from each bass and chord indicate the time required to hold a given button, based on the times indicated by the notes on the treble clef. When a specified bass or chord is repeated, a "slash" indicates the repetition. If a

bass or chord is not to be played at a certain time, a lower case "x" can be used to indicate that. This notation can obviously be extended to more complicated cases (say with multiple bass or chord button combinations) either by adding more lines, or by specifying the button names horizontally, depending on whether there is more room vertically or horizontally. Figure 2 shows a compressed form of Fragment #1. For an additional example, see the next figure which shows

the start of the next movement in "Wedding of the Winds." Here we see the bass note is held for the time of 2 eighth notes, then released for the time of one eighth note. The chords are not played for the first eighth note period, then are played twice in succession for the next two eighth note periods. (The 1/8 rests following the quarter bass notes are not explicitly shown here.)

Now consider the suggested compressed form shown in the last figure. Figure 3 shows a compressed form of Fragment #2.

In figure 4 you can see how the use of the underscore shows how the bass buttons are to be held. Also notice that the underscore is used to specify counterbass buttons. Readability could be improved by either changing the notation for counterbass buttons, or else the underscore extension could be changed to continuous hyphens.


NEWS OF THE EVENING ENSEMBLE and the FUN BAND:

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


