

today.) So Joe, whose Polka Bands still



Back to the meeting and yet more fun and entertainment.

Hold on to your hats and wallets. Paul Pasquali, nowworking out of his hometown, Salt Lake City, (who said "Denver"?) sat down with what looked like a normal (electronic) accordion. But there wasn't anything

"normal" about it, including, probably, the price. As the saying goes, it could do everything but slice bread. He's developed it over the past year, and it will be available at Colombo's in several months. The sounds could only be described as amazing. Guitars, pianos, brass, woodwind and string instruments as well as an entire orchestra were electronically hidden in the unassuming case. It was hard to notice Paul's skill as a musician, which was considerable, because we were so much in awe of the spectrum of this new device and the ease with which Paul moved from one presentation style to the next. His parting rendition of Malaguena brought the crowd to its feet. (It seems like we do that often at BAAC. The House of Parties may be a little run down. but it has seen some world class talent and presentations over the months.) (Editor's note: Say, Denny, do check out the price. The final performer deserves and gets a special write up in the newsletter. What a surprise! And where was **Rob** Campanella? When he hears that he missed a virtuoso button accordion player, he will never miss another meeting. Ever! And Vladimir Kallistov was every bit a virtuoso.

As he moved around the room during the evening you could sense that he was going to be very special. For those of you not at the meeting, Vladimir, as Russian as his name, was blind. He was tall and thin, but not skinny, with a full, welltrimmed beard, a dark suit and a dark pair of glasses. He showed obvious class without even opening up his accordion case. But when he began his first number, Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor, I thought Peter Di Bono (only several chairs distant from me) had died and gone to Classical Accordion Heaven. (Peter says that Classical Accordion Heaven is several octaves above normal accordion heaven, which doesn't even deserve capitalization in comparison.) Well, we were all in our own heavens as

Vladamir

To say that Vladamir Kallistov made an unforgettable impression on all those who attended the December meeting is a decided understatement. Just talk to anybody who was there....you will hear testimony of an amazingly facile young musician who will undoubtedly further the image of the accordion in the years to come.

We were awed by the sounds which Vladamir, BAAC's newest member, coaxed from his midi instrument with left hand convertible from stradella to freebass. Those who heard pieces of his story continued to be ever more impressed. Let us tell you a little about him.

He is a native of Russia, born there in 1960. Blind since birth, he is both highly intelligent and blessed with an unusual degree of both determination and independence. These traits have carried him through the music school in Odessa and subsequently through Moscow Conservatory, where he earned a degree in Musicology with excellent grades.

Vladamir has won prizes in numerous competitions, including the Pan Russo

Competition, the Prague International Competition, and, in Italy, the International Competition for classic accordion in Treviso, and the National Competition in Capranica Prenestina. He was special guest Castelfidardo for their 1993 Festival. He is a composer, and has written for instrumental ensembles and for orchestra. And he has given concerts, first in Moscow and later in Japan and Italy.

Vladamir, his pianist wife Svetlana, and their two children have spent the last three years in Italy, where he and Svetlana had planned to establish a music school. The Italian government has been slow in recognizing them as potential citizens, meaning that he can neither take a position nor establish a business there in the foreseeable future. Therefore, the couple have decided to try to emigrate to the US, where Vladamir would like to teach accordion, Svetlana would teach piano, and both would teach music theory. He is here on a visitor's visa hoping to obtain permanent visas for his family and to identify an area in which they could settle and teach.

While here, he felt that he needed to pay rent to the family in Richmond with whom he is staying and to send a little money to Italy, where rent is also charged. So, he has adopted the BART system as his second home. He travels BART alone and plays his acoustic instrument for hours at a time. He was recognized by our own local celebrity, Herb Caen, in his column of Friday, December 10th, as follows:

Seasonal pluses: The blind accordionist playing Bach fugues in the Montgomery St. Metro station......

To assist in obtaining visas, Vladamir would like to make as many musical con-

tacts in this country as possible, especially with agents, clubs and organizations which he might join, or with agents or individuals who could help to promote him. A kind immigration lawyer in San Francisco has volunteered her help but needs more documented support in order to make a strong case.

Those of us who have talked with and listened to him are convinced that his musical prowess combined with his personal characteristics make him a powerful spokesman for the capabilities of our favorite instrument. What an inspiring teacher he will be!

He must return soon to Italy, but we are quite sure we will see him again soon. Meantime, he has recorded a cassette tape which is available for purchase from BAAC for \$10.00. It contains:



On our arrival, we met other youngsters and immediately took over the slippery dance floor until the musicians brought their violins and accordions out and began to play their repertoire of polkas, schottisches, and waltzes.

I was transfixed and thrilled by the sounds and melodies which emanated from these strange "button boxes" while the grownups whirled around the dance floor.

Then, tiring, we were fed and wrapped up in our parents' overcoats and laid down to sleep on the benches along the walls.

Eventually, the dance ended and we trudged our way homeward through the snow, my head still ringing with those unforgettable tunes. I really caught the "bug."

Knowing that most of our readers have similar experiences in their backgrounds, I wish to bring out the purpose of this story. Expose your young children and friends to accordion music at an early

age. They will appreciate it and you will benefit by knowing that you are preserving and nurturing the culture and music of the accordion.

BAAC Board Meeting

November 16, 1993

- Meeting was convened 30 minutes early to allow more time for conversation with our guests, Clifton Buck-Kauffman and Rebecca Browne of the Cotati Festival Committee. See article p.7 for results of this conversation.
- Treasurer Frank Montoro reported \$8892 in our bank accounts.
- Administrative guru Algis Ratnikas has obtained a voice-mail telephone for our Club. The number is (415) 974-9210. For \$30/month the system will record messages left for us, and BAAC will be listed in the San Francisco, Oakland, and San Jose directories.
- Algis is working with the Stoschers to draft a format for BAAC business cards. He will then purchase 1000 generic cards for use by all BAAC members.
- BAAC will not receive the \$200 promised to us by the Anchorage Accordion Festival because we did not fulfill our part of the bargain. Fewer players than promised appeared, and most of them did not stay in the places designated by Anchorage. The Board agreed that those who had played as promised should be reimbursed the promised \$25. from our treasury.
- Similarly, we will pay those who played at Festa Italiana \$25 each as promised even though we have received no money from the Festa. In this case, BAAC members were not at fault, but

- apparently attendance at Festa was down this year, and they are experiencing cash flow problems.
- Frank Panacci has been instrumental in finding a new location for our general meetings, at 285 Abbott Ave. in Daly City, part of the Daly City Park and Rec. Dept. Considerable time was spent at this board meeting discussing the pros (which are many) and cons of this move and then discussing when it should happen. It was agreed that we should move as of January rather than in December, Meanwhile, Frank will move our bank account to Daly City and Dominic will work on filing with the State and the IRS to obtain non-profit status, both as required in our contract with Daly City. Since the facility is not available on Monday, the Board changed our meeting date to the first Tuesday of the month. We discussed at length methods for handling the serving of alcoholic beverages and decided not to sell liquor at our new location. We will, however, sell soft drinks. Those wishing additional beverages will need to bring their own.
- One hundred dollars was allocated for purchase of goodies for our December meeting.
- One hundred fifty dollars was allocated for an elegant dinner for two for Veikko Ahvenainen as thanks for his fantastic performance at our November meeting.

COTATI, 1993, Revisited

You may recall that BAAC members expressed a variety of unhappy sentiments concerning the Cotati Festival at our October general meeting. A suggestion was made at the time that we invite persons involved with planning the Festival to meet with BAAC to hear and hopefully address some of our concerns.

Your Board decided to follow through on that suggestion, but to invite them to the Board Meeting rather than two the General Meeting. As a result, at its November meeting, the BAAC Board of Directors held a dialog with guests Clifton Buck-Kauffman and Rebecca Browne of the Cotati Festival Committee.

Josephine's minutes of that meeting report that an open discussion ensued with lively participation from both the Board and from Clifton and Rebecca. She concludes that much was accomplished. Plans for next year's Festival are in some degree of flux because they are considering mechanisms by which they can charge a small admission fee (thereby insuring financial viability) and by which they can can accommodate more attendees. These plans include the possibility of closing the main intersection for that weekend and placing three or four stages a distance from one another. In that way, different musical types could be featured on each stage to please our great variey of musical tastes. Attendees would be free to move from one stage to another or to stay in one spot.

Clifton and Rebecca agreed with us that the Jam Tent's location be more carefully considered, with BAAC's input weighing heavily in the location decision. No more specific decision was made for the moment because the Committee is considering expanding the site in '94. We also agreed that there must be better scheduling of announcements made by the MC.

Next time the program will include performers on all 3 (or 4) stages, unless one stage is specifically designated as a dropin, spontaneous site and is not scheduled before the Festival.

- Non-alcoholic drinks will be sold at our new meeting location. The Board decided to first ask Diane MacKenzie, from the House of Parties, if she was interested in handling this for us. Should Diane decline, Frank Panacci volunteered to handle it on a trial basis.
- Next meeting January 12th at Frank Montoro's.
