Steve and Mike Trucco

Steve and Michael Trucco are a father-son duo from Stockton who have been playing together for over 16 years. Steve, the father, began studying accordion in 1949 at age 10. His teacher, John Pisacco, was trained by the Pezzolo brothers of San Francisco and at that time was the finest accordion teacher in the Valley. Steve started out his professional career with a four-piece band in the Stockton area. Still today, Steve has the same four-piece group and is still playing for all kinds of events.

Son Michael has been playing since age 9, when he studied with Pam Turbetti of Stockton. After five years of lessons, he began playing professionally with his father's group and also on his own. His mentor is Dr. Harry Gay, also of Stockton, and whom we all know and love. Steve and Mike play mostly Italian waltzes and polkas. Their unique style of playing duets has been honed almost to an art form. When they play together, the two accordions seem to meld into a single accordion.

I'm sorry I do not have a photo to post here, but many of you are already familiar with this popular duo.

Joe Domitrowich has entertained and delighted us at our picnics and at some of our meetings over many years. He is an expert MIDI player. His repertoire ranges from classical and traditional European to country/bluegrass, Cajun, Tex-Mex and nostalgic standards, Latin, pop—you name it. He has something to please every taste. Joe weaves together the authentic accordion reed sounds with the wide variety of voices of the MIDI. He does not use pre-recorded rhythms—everything Joe plays is "real-time," and




