Peter Di Bono then enthusiastically urged our many great artists to come forward and help out with the Musical Performance Fund. It was suggested that this fund be named the "Mary Casey Musical Performance Fund," and everyone was in agreement...

Peter also reminded us that our annual membership dues are coming up on July 1st and that new membership cards will be issued at that time. It's incredible that our club has mushroomed from 8 members to 158 in its first year!

More business:..Peter diplomatically led us through the proper procedures for the election of new officers and the appointment of a board of directors. This process took quite some time, but it is hoped that all members are satisfied with the procedures taken and the outcome:

Peter then read a letter from Art Van Damme to the club. Art thanked everyone for inviting him to perform and remarked that this was the first time he had been honored by a club in this manner.

Frank Montoro told us that he and Lou Jacklich are hoping that 100 accordionists will attend the Alameda County Fair in Pleasanton on July 2nd from 1 to 5 P.M. Sounds like great fun!

Dominic Palmisano took the floor to express his feelings about the club. His initial two goals in helping form the club were to create an club which would lift the feelings of accordion players, and to locate accordion friends for his cousin Joe Catalano. Dominic believes that his goals were overwhelmingly met and that he and Lou Soper have successfully co-con-

ducted the club from its beginnings to the outstanding club it is today. **Dominic** declined the nomination for president because he feels that **Lou** has done a fine job and that we should continue following his lead.

Peter then acknowledged the guests - all 19 of them, and at Last we were able to take an intermission. Great job, Peter!

We Want music! Domenic Saso opened the second half of the meeting by introducing our guest performer, Don Haas. There is nothing that can be said to do justice to his phenomenal talent, so I will leave it to others to describe his astounding playing. He began with Charlie Parker's "Confirmation", followed by Herbie Hancock's "Dolphin Dance", then two numbers composed by Horace Silver, "Nica's Dream" and "Summer in Central Park". A change of pace came with his rendition of Duke Ellington's "In a Sentimental Mood." During his performance. Don would explain the musical theory for each piece. He constantly referred to the major scale and its 8 tunes. As he talked about their relation to music, many of us were working on our own understanding. Here is another area where Don demonstrates his mastery of music, his ability to explain it. We're hoping that he will return to our club for another evening of sitting and hearing another "world class" musician.

At the close, Mr. Haas surprised us by donating an Excelsion ladies' model accordion!

A BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF MAESTRO ANTHONY GALLA-RINI

Anthony Galla-Rini was born in Manchester, Connecticut on January 18, 1904. When Tony was only four, his his father, John, began teaching him the cornet, adding accordion lessons three years later and subsequently piccolo, flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, French horn, trumpet, trombone, and tuba! Anthony's two older sisters were already playing the violin and cornet John Galla-Rini was a band-master who was driven by a vision of stage success for a family act, so he carefully trained his children and used their collective talents to create a very successful vaudeville act, The Galla-Rini Four. His two sisters left the act in 1916 and Anthony went on his own in 1924.

During the years from 1911 to 1932, Anthony Galla-Rini played the Keith, Orpheum and Interstate Circuits which later became the RKO Circuit (Radio-Keith-Orpheum), as well as the Pantages and Leow Circuits. Many of his performances were broadcast in all major cities of the USA and Canada. He appeared on the same programs with such stars as Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Jimmy Durante, the Marx Brothers, Marie Dressler, Bill Robinson,

Jack Oakie, and Fred Allen.

In 1932, Galla-Rini abandoned all the other instruments except his first love, the accordion, and decided to concentrate on a career with significantly different objectives than those which had been inculcated in him by his father. These included:

• 1 Teaching the accordion as a professionally recognized instrument

•2 Exploiting the full potential of the accordion

•3 Composing and arranging music

• 4 Promoting the accordion in the concert field.

Galla-Rini then opened his first studio in San Francisco, where he experienced great success teaching the instrument he loved. Also, while here, he met and married another love of his life, the former Dina Louise Petromilli, daughter of Pasquale Petromilli, owner of the famous Guerrini Accordion Factory.

Galla-Rini lived in San Francisco until about 1936, when he and his family moved to New York City to further the other career goals that he had set for his life. He had come to believe that these objectives could best be achieved in New York City

where most of the music publishers were located.

With his now outstanding reputation, Galla-Rini quickly established himself in this new locale and began a series of marvelous achievements. He opened a private studio and began putting his dynamic ideas into print as well as publishing in Accordion News magazine. He helped found the American Accordionists' Association and the Confederation International des Accordeonistes.

Today, Anthony Galla Rini resides in San Marcos, California where he is very active in promoting the accordion. With his many accomplishments and worldwide recognition as the foremost leader of the accordion, is it any wonder that he is known the world over as "Mister Accordion"? The world will probably never again see a master of the accordion like Anthony Galla-Rini.


