May 8th, Birthday Party for Art Van Damme. All BAAC members are invited to attend Art Van Damme's 75th birthday celebration, being organized by Sylvia Prior, Frank Marocco, and Kenny Kotwitz (the latter two of whom played and recorded with Art). As an aside, this party coincides with Art's announcement of his retirement, something that will doubtless sadden many of us who have enjoyed him so very much at our Presidio concert 4 years ago and at Cotati.

**June 21st.** San Francisco's 4th annual Day of Music, called Making Waves 1995, is a city-wide musical festival currently in preparation. Last year the Festival included over 30 stages of live music including blues, reggae, jazz, zydeco, folk, alternative, rock, etc., etc. in every corner of the City.

Even though the concert seems out of reach at this time, Myron wants to keep the possibility open. Perhaps we might find a co-sponsor, or he might come to the Bay ea for another event, he said. We'll continue to look for possibilities.

Finally, my favorite piece of all time, Rhapsody in Blue featured a complete orchestra with solo clarinet and piano. 



# March Board Meeting Synopsis

- Treasurer reported \$ 7,363. in savings and checking combined.
- Our Treasurer also reported that BAAC has finally been granted non-profit status with the Feds. That means for all you members that you may deduct contributions to BAAC on Schedule A of your annual personal accounting to the IRS. You can also deduct the current value of an accordion which you might decide to donate to BAAC!! (Hint!)
- After a long discussion about the wisdom of BAAC sponsoring a Myron Floren concert, it was decided that we should drop the idea right now. There were two difficulties. One was that it appeared that expenses would be between \$5,000 and \$6,000, at a minimum, and we didn't want to put club money at risk. The other was that there is at the moment no chair for the planning committee, and no good plans for promoting the concert to bring in nearly enough people to cover expenses.
- The annual BAAC picnic will be held Sunday, June 11th at Swiss Park in Newark.
- The logo contest closes on April 1st. Please submit original art work for consideration before that date.
- Ed Massolo and Frank Panacci are traveling to Seattle as Guest Artists for the Northwest Accordion Club on May 8th. They are the other part of the exchange in which Bonnie Birch played so successfully for us in October.
- The time has come to name a nominating committee. Algis Ratnikas and Bob Berta agreed to be representatives on the committee from the Board; Frank will recruit three members at the March meeting to give a committee of five.
- Frank Montoro offered to organize BAAC's booth at the Cotati Accordion Festival this year.

Our April general meeting will be especially tasty, because we are trying something different. We'll spend some time at that meeting sampling and sharing desserts which we are asking each attendee to bring.

# Coming soon.... BAAC Elections

Elections again. It seems like just yesterday, doesn't it? Well, in case you've forgotten the details, here is a reminder of how we conduct elections.

Our by-laws specify that we choose a Nominating Committee in March composed of two Board members and three persons from the general membership. That Committee deliberates between the March and April general meetings and chooses one person for each elected office (5 officers and 5 additional Board members).

They present their recommendations at the April general meeting, at which time the floor will be opened for additional nominations. Those wishing to nominate someone for an office must observe the following rules: (1) you must first obtain the consent of the person you wish to nominate; (2) no person may be nominated for more than one office; and (3) our by-laws state that two consecutive years is the maximum time that any one person may hold a given office.

The election is held at the May general meeting. Members will be asked to vote for any office which is contested.

The Nominating Committee is at work as I write and you read. Should they contact you, we hope you will be generous with your time and abilities and will agree to help. Whether they contact you or not, please consider who you think you would like to have representing you in BAAC and arrange (with that individual's permission) to nominate him/her at the April general meeting. Then be sure to attend in May and vote.
