ON OCTOBER 12, 1990, accordion history was made as THOSE DARN ACCORDIONS! became the first all accordion band from San Francisco to perform at the semi-annual accordion competition which was held in Castelfidardo, Italy.

TDA! was entered in the pop music category. The audition was held at the - believe it or not - the Church of San Francesco. A representative from each group drew a card to determine his/her group's order of appearance. I drew the first slot. We hurriedly donned our flashiest show-wear and promptly took the stage. We had 15 minutes in which to perform and started the program off with our signature medley of the Theme from 2001 and Viva Las Vegas. We followed with the Theme from Perry Mason, Walk, Don't Run and Stairway to Heaven. The band played flawlessly and although the judges were amused by our costumes and selection of material, we placed fourth out of a two band category. No band was awarded first or second place and the other entrant received third place. Even though we didn't win, the members of the competition greatly enjoyed our enthusiasm by bestowing upon us a large trophy.

All in all, the competition was a lot of fun and a great experience. The band is really excited about a return to Italy in 1992...

A Profile Of Toni DiBono

If you have ever wondered how a parent passes on the gift of music to his children, you might take a page from Tony's story. Tony started playing accordion when he was 17 years old. By the time his first child, Reno, came along, he had almost quit playing. He picked it up again some years later becoming a closet accordionist. He would close the doors of the living room and play for himself mostly.

One day his son, Reno, asked his father if he could play the accordion? Tony was absolutely delighted. Tony tried to teach Reno some of the basics but decided to let someone else do it. John Pezzolo, then later, Angelo Forsi gave Younger brother, Reno lessons. Peter, seeing his brother's enjoyment of music, asked of he too could play. Tony was overjoyed. The next teacher was Dino Benetti who had played at Tony's own wedding in 1939. Tony asked Dino if he would take him on as a student, so the DiBonos became an accordion family.

The accordion picnics of the 50's became the performing stage for the DiBonos. Dominic Palmisano recalls looking forward to attending the picnics just to see this extraordinary trio. Dominic says, "I was in complete awe of their wonderful father/son relationship." Later on, Tony, Reno, Peter and Bobby Molinari on drums became a combo. Tony explained, "I just wanted the kids out to meet the people." Those of you who attended our last meeting can attest to Tony's success when the trio once again reunited to produce beautiful music.

At 73, Tony is enjoying retirement with is wife of 51 years, Caline. He is extremely proud of his sons who he describes as fine fathers, husbands and sons...and we might add, "and very accomplished musicians."
