Ed and Frank I hope will forgive my huge oversight and come back soon.

### News from Bob Berta in Michigan . . .

The Michigan Accordion Club is having a big recognition banquet for Stas Wisniach, a renowned polka legend. There will also be other big name polka performers as well as jazz and more. The Michigan Accordion Pops Orchestra, directed by Lana Gore, will be performing., plus three younger local virtuosi: Sarah Caruso, Georgiana Leonard and Adam Bell. Bob strongly suggests that we should not pass up the opportunity to hear them if they come to the SF area. He calls them "future Peter Soaves in the making." Of the "older" players Bob is especially impressed by John Shollack, one of the most "musical" players he has ever heard—superb dynamics and phrasing—plus Shollack is at home playing any genre of music.

Bob has hooked up with two MIDI accordionists, one a younger and the other an older person. They have shared a lot of music, and Bob is looking forward to spending more time with them.

A bit of trivia Bob shares with us: Bob's 10-year-old daughter is working on a special project for school, about the song America the Beautiful. Looking in a bunch of books from the library, Bob discovered that the fellow who composed the music for that tune—Samuel Ward—was primarily an accordionist! This was before the days of the piano accordion. The composer started playing button accordion at age 6 in the mid-1800's and later took up a career in music, playing church organ, composing religious music, etc. (Editor's note: Looking on the Internet, I found that the lyrics, written by Katharine Lee Bates in 1893 while taking in the view from Pike's Peak, Colorado, were published in time for the fourth of July 1895 and became an instant hit. Soon after that, the lyrics were set to Samuel Ward's music, and later revised to a new version in 1904. The current version, which came along a few years after that, was highly recommended by many as our national anthem—but The Star Spangled Banner won out in 1931.)

Otherwise, Bob reports that he and the family are all well and happy, and two of his kids, Andrew (age 9) and Kathleen (age 10) have taken up cello! Val

### A Visit with a Very Special Centenarian

On October 28, Val Kieser and Dick Schiller had a wonderful hour-long visit with the **Maestro Anthony Galla-Rini** in Corona, CA. Tony would LOVE to hear from any of you—cards, notes, photos. His address: *Maestro Anthony Galla-Rini*; *Garden Retreat*; 853 W. Crestview St.; Corona, CA 92882. Phone (909) 738-9536. A Few Random Notes from our Visit: The Maestro (a member of the *original* San Francisco Accordion Club!) was eager to talk about his life experiences with the accordion. The first accordion he ever played was a *Galleazzi* three-row chromatic with 32 buttons on the left hand and a lever for minor and 7th chords. Diminished was easy because there are only 4 diminished chords covering all 12 tones (and only 3 augmented chords).

Over the years he experimented with different bass configurations for the accordion. One had 8 rows of buttons in the left hand: the usual 6 plus two more for other octaves. Galla-Rini set up a bass arrangement that, using switches, covers 4 octaves of bass notes, an improvement on the old 8-row system. I have seen him perform the chromatic scale and also arpeggios seamlessly using this method. The finer Petosa accordions have this bass setup. Tony has played only Petosa since 1960.

When asked what makes for the most beautiful sound in an accordion, he said it is how reeds are laid inside the accordion.

Tony feels that the accordion had seen many advances over the years, resulting in some modern instruments of very high quality.

Tony went into accordion full time following his Vaudeville days very early in the (20th) century. He played many instruments and got rid of all but the accordion.

Among peers whom Tony respected was Charles Magnante, whose right-hand technique was his strong point. Most of his peers didn't do much with the bass. After years of being written in

the treble clef, eventually the bass in accordion music came to be written in bass clef.

In the late 40's Tony played a *Dallapé*. He ordered his specifications at Dallapé but they couldn't make what he wanted and didn't follow his chart, so Tony had to make a new chart—but the bass manufacturers still could make the bass only one way.

One time, following a concert, Melba Yale congratulated Tony for "switching to free bass"—but what she heard was Tony just covering his 4 octaves in the regular Stradella bass using his bass setup and switches!

In 1936 Tony designed a free-bass system with Italo-American Accordion Co. in Chicago.

On a visit to Venice many years ago with Dina, Tony's first wife, when they arrived, one man carried 8 suitcases (of varying sizes) up the hotel stairs—all at once! Tony calls Venice "Dog Heaven."

We were happy to see the Maestro looking well. Again, he would really appreciate hearing from any of you. VK and DS




