

Everyone wanted more, so Ron and Carole's encore was *Don't Take Your Love From Me*.



#### Schwyzeroergeli

The basic mechanical principal of a Schwyzeroergeli, a free reed, is actually already thousands of years old. It is based on a reed that is actuated by an air stream, creating a sound as the reed begins to vibrate. The first "accordion like" instruments appeared in the middle of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, where increasing numbers of such reeds were used and could be actuated in parallel. Cyrill Demian of Austria was the first to register a patent of an "Accordion" in 1829. They started out with only 5 – 10 flaps, each of which created a different tone when air was pushed or pulled through it.



Johan Ulrich Herrmann was the first to build a Schwyzeroergeli in 1836, the "Langenauerli". Although the initial version did not have a resonance chamber, it exhibited superior tone quality compared to prior instruments. The demand for such instruments started to rise, and by 1843 they had build more than 100 Langenauerli.

A few years later, Robert Iten born in Unteraegeri started out modifying a Langenauerli, and then ended up building his own improved version. In 1883, Iten created the first instrument with the name "Schwyzerorgel". His instruments were well received and spread as far as the region of Bern. Unfortunately, with Iten's death, the quality of his instruments soon decreased as well.

Three important pioneers of the Schwyzeroergell as we know it today are Alois Eichhorn, Josef Nussbaumer, and Ernst Salvisberg. Their instruments were made with so much craftsmanship that many of the original instruments still work perfectly today, 90 years later. These instruments and the "Volksmusik" that is played with them are still very popular, as is evident by the still respectable number of manufacturers. Today there are still about a docent makers of Schwyzeroergeli in Switzerland, and they are all still made by hand. What a great

contribution by all of these talented craftsmen, without whom our culture would hardly be as unique and rich as we still enjoy today.

# Excerpts from an Article from Bay News 9 in Tampa, Submitted by Michael Sanossian Accordions Are Cool in One N.D. Town Monday, October 23, 2006, WISHEK, N.D. (AP)

A few miles off the Lawrence Welk Highway is a community where the sound of "O Du Lieber Augustin" is as common as anything by Britney Spears, Jay-Z or Garth Brooks. Wishek calls itself the "Sauerkraut Capital of the World," and German is almost as common as English. High school music teacher Janet Wolff isn't afraid to teach the accordion.

Her teenage students don't balk at picking up the instrument or performing in an auditorium full of old-timers who take their German traditions seriously. "It's something different," said 17-year-old Kasandra Huber." I though it would be fun. And it is fun."

Wishek High School has 110 students. Huber is one of seven who play the accordion.

Wolff, who grew up in the Minneapolis area, married a German with accordions after taking the teaching job in Wishek in 1988. (She) started teaching accordion four years ago, using instruments borrowed from people in town.

Said Jason Hochhalter, 18, who looks like he would be more at home in a weight-lifting room than a music room, "I was just going to play it for a day, and then I ended up keeping it."

Helmi Harrington, who runs music studios in the Minneapolis suburb of Burnsville and in Superior, Wis., is the Director of *A World of Accordions* museum in Duluth, Minn. She is not surprised to hear that teenagers in N.D. play the accordion. "In the 1990's there was a trend toward nostalgia, toward finding our roots in America," she said. "That always brings people back to ethnic connectors." Harrington, who has played accordion for more than half a century, said the instrument is unique in that it creates melody, harmony and rhythm like a piano or organ, but is more portable. However, with its keyboard, pushbuttons and bellows, "it is a very difficult instrument to play well," said Harrington.

Wolff said she cannot envision teaching the accordion in a big city like Minneapolis, but has never had a student in Wishek refuse to try it.

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


