October Program: A very interesting Variety

President Frank Montoro passed on greetings from Vince Cirelli, who very sadly is in Peninsula Hospital in Millbrae recovering from a badly broken hip. Peter Di Bono also had talked with Vince earlier today and indicated that Vince is in a lot of pain but seems to be on the mend. Well, Vince, we send you our heartfelt wishes for a speedy and complete recovery. We all miss you!

Frank asked if we had any first-timers in the audience (we did), and if there were members from other clubs (there were several: from Accordion Club of the Redwoods, Silicon Valley Accordion Society and, two of our stars, Mike and Steve Trucco from the Good Time Accordion Club).

Frank also made a plea for people not to be shy about playing for our club—it is for everyone, not just experienced players. Frank then thanked Peter Di Bono for all his help in making the transition to the presidency a smooth one, and for helping with the

sound system. Peter also acted as our MC today.

First on our musical program was Sol Fenster. a faithful member and an expert harmonica player! Sol told us that he is playing a small

harmonica which he uses mostly for Yiddish tunes. His first tune was about a Jewish mother who just might have been the inspiration for Al Jolson's "Mammy." Then he played a balalaika song that is usually sung in a group: "Tomba-la-tomba-lalaika, happy we'll be," followed by Bei Mir Bist du Schoen and a Yiddish lullaby about a sleepy child.

Sol told us he is self-taught on harmonica, using the Hohner instruction book. You learned well, Sol—and

Naomi Zamir from Menlo Park was our next player. The first thing she did was thank Sol because Naomi's father played harmonica.

Naomi continued the theme begun by Sol, by playing some beauti-

ful Klezmer, Gypsy and Eastern European music. Her first piece was "Have a Glass of Wine," a medley of varied tempos, major and minor, and some nice bass runs. The next piece, of which Naomi didn't know the name, was one she learned at a Klezmer camp in Canada. It's in both minor and major keys and very lively.

Naomi's last piece was music from a Balkan camp "mixed up with other stuff." Naomi does all her playing standing up and without even looking at the keyboard! Well, that very small accordion has a big sound and was beautifully played for us. Many thanks, Naomi!

Lynn Ewing and Sharon Walters Greyhosky need no introduction in our club! They played a brand new special program for us today. First was the Big Chuch Tarantella written by Stas Venglevski for John Bonica up in Portland. My understanding is that "chuch" means "donkey" so I suspect this was all in fun. The piece contained both minor and major segments.

Then they played the lovely Beautiful Days, Galla-Rini arrangement (but written by Pietro Deiro). Wow! What a beautiful waltz piece!

Stas Venglevski recorded a CD, "Illusions," about various animals. This one was Cat's Ball from that CD. The piece, again, contains both minor and major parts. Lynn started off the piece with a big "Hissss" and ended it with a "Meow." Adorable!

Sharon and Lynn then played another piece from Stas' "Illusions": While I'm Away, containing a modest and effective bit of bellow shake in each part, and with a beautiful ending.



Their encore was *Maccolin de Fiore* (forgive my lack of knowledge of Italian spelling). Terrific show, as always, Mike and Steve!






