He next performed favorite numbers from two of his sound tracks, the first from Dr. Zhivago. Somewhere My Love, and the second from The Godfather, Speak Softly Love. Certainly we have never heard these numbers played more beautifully! It was obvious to our membership that we were sitting with a Master...My Favorite Things was done in true Marocco fashion followed by a little Michel LeGrande music, What Are You Doing With the Rest of Your Life? If you missed this meeting, all we can say is, you missed a thrill you probably won't have the chance to repeat. Our heartfelt thanks to a great performer and wonderful person. His wife, perhaps. gave the greatest tribute of all. To those around her she stated that Frank is just like you see him tonight, always the same, quiet but with a sense of humor, and a wonderful husband and father. 

For a small fee you may borrow music from a collection of over 600,000 items! You may also wish to consider donating music to this worthy organization. They have 6 different catalogs available for purchase. Their collection of accordion music is unfortunately rather small; it is listed on two sheets, which I can show to those who are interested. Their popular music catalog has 11,000 titles. I am planning on ordering that catalog.

The annual fee to join Bagaduce is only \$5.00 for individuals. The minimum mail order charge is \$2.00, and the music must be sent to and from via UPS. The telephone number to contact Bagaduce is: (207) 374-5454. It is located in Blue Hill, Maine.


