The Cotati Accordion Festival will be history by the time you read this, but I want to thank those of you who went out to Cotati to enjoy the music, and support the accordion.


I want to express my condolences, and those of our members, to Jimmy Hillman on the recent passing of his dear mother, Rose.

We'll have Alexei back soon so we can hear the other music he was going to play for us.

The **Don Nurisso Trio** then took the stage, and jazz was the focal point of this session. Don fast-forwarded that 50's favorite, "Teach Me Tonight," into the 21st century with some impressive fills, and modern chord changes. The popular latin/jazz standard, "Summer Samba," featured tenor saxman, **Jay Witt**, combined with bassist, **Steve Aurbach**. The three took choruses, and everyone was amazed at how easy they made it look. My favorite, "Do You Know What It Means To Miss New Orleans?", had everyone toe-tapping. They finished with the beautiful ballad, "Don't Misunderstand," written by Gordon Parks.

During the intermission we were treated to a fantastic array of desserts (which I, only through sheer will-power, was able to avoid). **Evelyn Baulch**, in her final performance as director of marketing and sales for our drawing (raffle), got the crowd to cough up about \$150.00, half of which went to out Scholarship Fund. I am pleased to report that **Barbara Winter** was the lucky winner of the other half this month.


The second half of the program featured **The Di Bono Brothers**, "Fratelli Di Bono???," Peter and

The oft-quoted phrase from the movie Field of Dreams, "Build it and they will come," referred to the baseball greats of the past, the legends who inspired dreams of greatness and promise in the minds of young boys and girls who imagined walking onto one of many big league fields, Yankee Stadium, Brooklyn's Ebbetts Field, Boston's Fenway Park, or Chicago's Wrigley Field among others, while being greeted by wildly adoring fans -- and then stepping up to the plate in World Series Game Seven, bases loaded in the bottom of the ninth and.....hitting the grand one! How many boys young and old have savored that particular dream?

And so it is with us accordionists, mostly older now, but who remember 'way back when, while others dreamt of baseball stardom, our own special dream of fame pictured us walking onto that stage at the Ed Sullivan Theater in front of an auditorium full of adoring fans mesmerized by the flying fingers, lightning glissandos, super-human triple

bellows-shakes, and the putting of such emotion into songs, bringing the audience to its collective feet in a wild affirmation of greatness. *Come and he will play!*

And so in the small town of Cotati, California with its yearly celebration of our beloved accordion, **Dick Contino**, the most exciting accordionist of our time, moved across the stage towards the instrument sitting on the floor center stage. 74 years young, his step was a mite slower. Our Legend had arrived, and he had come to play what turned out to be an amazing performance, to be remembered forever! Dick was solidly backed by the **Ron Borelli Trio**, consisting of Ron on keyboard, drummer **Bob Belanski** and bassist **Rich Duncan**, each of whom has a long and impressive list of credentials. Watching Dick's every move, the trio responded beautifully to his musical nuances, pushing the level to greater heights. Beginning with his famed

opener, *Bellavia*, Dick launched into familiar renditions along with heartfelt vocals, and finished with his grand rendition of his signature song, *Lady of Spain*, coupled with the famed patriotic medley. The songs, the lightning glissandos, the finger rolls and chromatic runs were still there! And with the thundering triple bellows-shakes (unbelievably, performed while standing), Dick showed that he still walks the walk, what we mere men could only dream of doing! The emotion became more intense as the audience, sensing that this was a special moment, crowded toward the stage, cheering him on through the grand finale of *Lady of Spain*, the one that put the accordion mystique into television sets around the world!

Dick Contino gave his all in this performance. As he jumped off the state, exhausted, into the crowd, I saw wetness in his eyes, as in mine and many others'. Our Legend...in our time....Thank you Dick Contino!

were held with the great Anthony Galla-Rini. It is hard to believe that my idol is a century old.

The afternoon class Monday was given by Esther Lanting on the subject of articulation. Tuesday we had Joan Sommers talking about the free bass and Stradella systems. We played scales and arpeggios with different fingerings. Joan played "March of the Dwarfs" by Grieg, "Come Back to Sorrento," a variation on "Silent Night," and more. That was a treat! Wednesday we had John Simkus talking about playing in an orchestra, stage etiquette, plus some sight reading. After 3:00 p.m. was "free" time (no group practices). I had a lesson with Joan Sommers. She had me play Galla-Rini's arrangement of "The Rain" (a French classic) the right way. I really enjoyed the lesson.

Evenings were spent doing group playing with Stella Allison and having parties—yes, with more accordion playing.

Wednesday night was the camp Dance Night. We heard Swiss music, German music, Myron Floren tunes, Slovenian tunes (played by Yours Truly), country and other kinds of music. I never dreamed that I would dance the polka with my idol Mr. Galla-Rini's son-in-law, Bud. He's a lot of fun.

There was accordion playing in the dining hall during lunch and dinner. Sometimes the room came alive with dancing and people having a blast. I danced with a couple of cute young guys. Wow! And nobody walked out when I played "Silent Night"!

The last day was spent rehearing for the evening Camp Concert. The concert was held in the beautiful Shiley Theater on campus. The camp ensemble was conducted, as always, by Maestro Galla-Rini himself.

Brazil's Supreme Court Acquits Opera Director Who Mooned Audience

Associated Press, 20 August 2004, SÃO PAULO, Brazil The Supreme Court has quashed charges of obscene exposure levied last year against avant-garde theater director Gerald Thomas. Thomas was charged with obscene exposure for mooning an audience after an opera performance in August of 2003.

Following a performance of Tristan and Isolde at Rio de Janeiro's municipal theater, Thomas shocked audience members and much of the cast by pulling down his pants and displaying his buttocks in response to jeers at the curtain call.

On its Web site, the Supreme Court said it shelved the charges Tuesday night after deciding that Thomas' gesture "may have been rude and in bad taste" but not obscene. The gesture, the court added, was an "exercise in freedom of expression." The Supreme Court's decision freed Thomas of a possible jail term of up to a year.
