





Scandinavian Accordion Festival


SFAC member Jerry Tramontozzi of Massachusetts sent in a very nice article about — well, here's the gist (very much abbreviated): "Once upon a time the accordion was king. Now, many people consider it court jester. Yes, something happened. A musical coup occurred. Public opinion changed. And an instrument once widely appreciated fell from favor. However, (the town of) Foster is the site of tomorrow's Scandinavian Accordion Festival. 'People who criticize the accordion wish they could play it,' says accordionist Jerry Tramontozzi of Arlington, Mass., the Festivals' organizer. 'They really have not sat down and listened to an accordion.' 'Elvis came around with his guitar,' Tramontozzi says. 'He kind of took the thunder out of the accordion. So all the youngsters said, 'I want o play guitar.' Then the Beatles came along. And then youngsters said, "I want to play drums.' They want to play guitar and drums, rock n' roll. There goes the accordion.'

"Tramontozzi remains optimistic about the accordion's future. Even if teenagers and young adults aren't captivated now, 'I think we'll get them when they retire."

It was part of a wonderful article by Ken Emerson, writing about a Random House book, The House that George Built, with a Little Help from Irving, Cole, and a Crew of About Fifty," by Wilfred Sheed (335 pages, \$29.95). "So many opera stars and aging rockers are riffling through the Great American Songbook these days that it's only a matter of time before Renée Fleming and Rod Stewart record a duet of "Side by Side." Wilfred Sheed's more expert review of the popular music standards of the first half of the 20th century—and the (mostly) men who composed them—is thus especially welcome...


"Mr. Sheed's chapters are character sketches as well as musical appreciations. When a songwriter's personality leaves him cold, his consideration of the music can be baffled or begrudging.... He lambastes the suburban sound of Rodgers and Hammerstein's 1950s musicals as a betrayal of Broadway's urbanity.

"Mr. Sheed greatly prefers the company of composers fresh off the boat from Eastern Europe (Irving Berlin, George Gershwin, Harold Arlen) or the train from the American hinterland (Carmichael, Johnny Mercer, Cole Porter)." Sounds like an interesting book! (I must admit that I haven't figured out who "George" refers to, unless it's Gershwin!) Val

Condensed from A Completely Personal and Non-Objective Report of my Experience at Coupe Mondiale

An intrepid group of five Northern Californians-Lynn and Gail Ewing, Sharon and Gus Greyhosky, and Marian Kelly traveled to the Washington, D.C. area for the World Cup Accordion Competition, which was held in the US for the first time in 25 years (the last time was 1981 in Kansas). Some Coupe facts: Since 1995 it has been won by a Russian every year except two: in 2005 by a Serb, and in 1999 by a Frenchman—and this year by a Canadian (but I heard he was a Russian immigrant). The Coupe was first held in France in 1938. The last American to win was Peter Soave in 1984.



Nearly \$25,000 in cash prizes was given to the winners of the six international categories for performers under 32 years of age. In addition, this year there was a one-time-only, women-only competition with no age limit, held in honor of the late Maddalena Bel Fiore, a noted accordionist, educator and composer associated with the AAA.

For me, the experience was special in a number of ways. First, my husband and I and the Greyhoskys were fortunate to be hosted by our good friends Joan and Dan Grauman, known to many of you as proprietor of "Squeezin' Art" and to others from recent attendance at various accordion camps. Joan also is a member of the AAA board and designer of the Coupe Mondiale logo.

The first thing Sharon, Gus, Gail and I did was visit the Kennedy Center, where we took a marvelous free tour of the entire venue and attended the first night concert, where we heard two terrific orchestras, the Akkordeonorchester Hof from Germany and the Jarosh Accordion Orchestra from Canada. The Kennedy Center holds nightly free concerts on their Millenium Stage at 6 p.m., 365 days a year; and from Aug. 14-17 various world accordion orchestras were the featured performers. I would particularly recommend checking out the night the fantastic orchestra from China performed, on Friday, Aug. 17. These performances are archived and can be accessed at any time by going to the Website www.kennedy-center.com/

The next day, I attended most of the competition at the Women's event. With the huge range of styles and pieces performed, I didn't think I would be able to tell how the judges would evaluate the players, but I came away with a strong opinion of who I thought should be in first, second and third place. To my surprise, these were exactly the winners the judges selected: Betty Jo Simon from Kansas took first; 17-year-old Barbara Slavinska from Poland took 2nd, and Patricia Bartell from Spokane, WA, a wonderfully creative player with an exuberant personality, came in 3rd.

In the evenings, not only did we have terrific orchestras from all over the world playing for

us, but we heard the "Senior Virtuoso Entertainment" category. This category was dominated by French chromatic players. Here we truly heard the fastest fingers on the planet. Our own Sammy Thomas literally stood out in this competition by being the only player who stood to perform, and for his superb connection with the audience. He received the only standing ovation from the audience in both rounds. By the end of the competition, I had a clear choice for first and 2nd place, and was hoping for a 3rd for Sammy. I feared that Sammy's repertoire, though most pleasing to the audience, was not at the same level of difficulty as the French players, and

he came in 5th. However, my first two picks won the top two spots, although in reverse order form my choice.

I originally thought that I would not spend that much time at the competitions, but the more I listened the more fascinated I became! The next day I decided to listen to the Senior Piano Accordion competition, in which Sammy was also competing. Sammy unfortunately made a serious goof in the middle of his second piece, which was very sad as he had a beautiful program. This knocked him out of placing. However, a young man from

New Zealand, Grayson Masefield, really impressed me with the passion and clean technique in his performance. Then a young man from Serbia, Stanislav Jusufovic, absolutely knocked my socks off. I thought wow, if this kid doesn't win first, there is NO justice! Well, he did win first, and Grayson came in third. The competition was so close, there was less than .5 between the first three places. Virtually all of these accordionists played free bass and extended keyboards, and I must say that there was some astounding left hand work. I can't imagine that a Stradella Bass player, no matter how talented, could seriously compete.

Marian Kelly volunteered to help *Coupe* coordinator Faithe Deffner, and did an outstanding job introducing the players for this category.

Being a dedicated ensemble player, I decided to attend the ensemble competition next. This was surpris-

ingly small, and dominated by Germans. I felt sorry for the judges on this one, as the choices and combinations of pieces varied so widely that I described it to my husband as being not comparing apples to oranges, but more

like apples to pork chops.

One of the fun parts of being at the Coupe was connecting with friends from camps in the recent and distant past, and comparing notes on the performances we attended. In particular, Michele Scheffler, Lynda Griffith and Karen Lee happened to be at a lot of the same performances I attended, and we had a surprising degree of consensus among us, which was amazingly similar to how the actual results came down from the judges.

The very last competition I attended was Round Four of the Senior Coupe Mondiale performance. This was the best of the best—the final six contestants each played for half an hour. For this round, many contestants played Scarlatti or Vivaldi or Pachelbel for one of the required pieces, and many played pieces by Viatcheslav Semionov. There, I had a musical peak experience—Alexander Sevastian from Canada played a program that I will never forget. His virtuosity and mastery brought tears to my eyes. I was truly thrilled when this young man received the first place of a \$5,000 cash prize (award from the ATG in honor of Anthony Galla-Rini) and a concert tour to Portugal.

A wonderful afternoon of live music is on tap for September 16th at 2:00 pm. I look forward to seeing all of you then. Play every day, and remember,



... that Ernst Angst just had a "landmark" birthday and he and Lupita are taking a well-deserved trip. Here's to many more birthdays, Ernst!


... that **Bruno Bianchini** landed in the hospital with a heart problem. Get well fast, Bruno! We want you to play for us!


