





# President's Message

Well, it's time to send in your dues if you haven't already. I thought I would bring you up to date about how we are doing with our finances at this, the end of our membership year. Thanks to our very capable Treasurer, Maryanne Romanowski, working with our equally capable membership chair, Valerie Kieser, they can report that the state of our club is sound. Our latest bank balance (Sept. 30) is \$10,432.

Our 2007-2008 proposed budget was based on a projection of \$11,889 income and \$14,064 expenses. Not exactly balanced, was it? This was our first try since we didn't have much to go on at the time we planned the year.

As it came out, we did better on our income, \$14,612, and our expenses were \$15,410. So what does it look like when we list the various items that make up our annual budget for the year? On the income side, 43% came from dues, and 32% came from admissions. The rest was divided between donations, the picnic and scholarship income.

On the expense side, 31% was the cost of producing our newsletter; 14% was for rent; 13% was for food; and 4% was

for scholarship awards. The remainder was spread over 14 other items.

We have 209 paid-up members (through 2008) which accounts for our most important source of income; and along with attendance at our monthly musical afternoons, these are what keep us going. That is why we depend on you to get your dues to us soon so we can plan the next fiscal year. (See Val's item elsewhere in this newsletter.)

We are grateful to the many members from outside our area who join our club just to receive our newsletter. Their interest and support is very important to the health of the club, and we are deeply indebted to them for their interest and support.

Incidentally, you are welcome to sit in on our Executive Board meetings, which are scheduled usually for the third Monday of the month at 2:00 at the Yacht Club. Every third month we schedule our meeting in the evening, so be sure to let us know if you are coming so we can inform you of our location, day and time.

The first musical presentation of the day was by Skyler Fell, showing off the new Hohner accordion she

has available in her shop, "Accordion Apocalypse." Skyler's brief performance consisted of a sad song followed by a faster, upbeat piece. I didn't get the names of the pieces, but Skyler is always entertaining and fun.

The next musical presentation was by three members of "Culann's Hounds," a partly offbeat, partly traditional group very

popular in the Bay Area. Entertaining us today were Renée de la Prade, Mike Kelleher, and Scott Marshall. They specialize in Irish (both traditional and modern) and Zydeco, as well as French Canadian music. Renée played Cairdin button accordion while

flinging her head and stomping her foot in a wild dance, and wearing a colorful costume. Mike Kelleher played acoustic guitar but also sometimes plays Irish system accordion; and Scott Marshall played the *Bodhrán* (very interesting percussion instrument).

They started off with a medley of Irish reels (*The Silver Spear, Toss the Feathers*, and *Rakish Paddy*). Next was *La Porte En Arrière* ("The Back Door"), a traditional Zydeco number. *High Roller*, the next piece, is a Culann's Hounds original, with vocal by Renée and Mike. *La Bastrirgue* (sp?) is a Québecois traditional number, with vocal by Renée, in Canadian French. They played 3 more numbers: *Irish Hornpipes* (Irish traditional), *Try and Try*, a Zydeco piece written by Renée for Culann's Hounds; and *Whiskey, You're the Devil* (traditional Irish). Terrific show! Be sure to "Google" Culann's Hounds to learn more about where and what they play.!

Renée reminded me to remind everyone that the "Bay Area Accordion Ladies Pinup Calendar" is due out in November—stay tuned!

And next-get ready-The Great Morganil-Frank Lima sported his latest of countless costumes he made himself all by hand. Besides Frank's amazing costumes, he is also an amazing player! He plays entirely by ear-doesn't even read musicand never misses a note, even playing with gloves and mask on! He wows me all over again every time I see/hear him. This time his costume was all black with small accordion-pleated strips of paper attached all over—see photo. It's impossible to describe!

Frank then played a funny Chicken Dance variation. Then more anecdotes and a variety of "Yellow" songs; and a lively version of Padam-Padam. Frank has published a beautiful colorful book all about Morgani, available for \$15, which helps defray his many expenses. It is worth every penny and more.

After the break, including Tuti's wonderful spread of food, Pres. Frank Montoro surprised Val with a big Happy Birthday from the club, which included a beautiful



very useful tips about "performance anxiety" (formerly called "stage fright"). Sev passed out sheets of paper for everyone to keep and learn from, summarizing his tips on dealing with performance anxiety. There are 8 points on the sheet. My favorite—the one I find the most useful (since I don't have space to give them all)—is No. 6: "Pay the Dues" with SLOW/ PATIENT/DELIBERATE pratice... "UNBEARABLY slow!" That's the most difficult part of practicing for me. Taking it SLOW!

Sev played for us, using a combination of amplified acoustic accordion and pre-recorded MIDI accompaniment: A Big Band Medley; Anema e Core; Cavaquinha; Night Train; Jolly Caballero; Forgotten Dreams; Tico-Tico; Just Because; and, as a closing number, Happy Trails. A very skillful and impressive use of the accordion and MIDI accompaniment, for a full and beautiful sound. Thanks so much, Sev! You always manage both to entertain and to educate us in a most pleasant way!

## About our Performers For October

The Almenrausch Schuhplattlers are well known in the San Francisco area. The Almenrausch is a reddish-pink wildflower that grows in the Bavarian Alps. Schuhplattler literally means "shoe-slapping" and refers to the knee-slapping, foot-stomping Bavarian dances most of us are familiar with. The Almenrausch Schuhplattlers were formed as a group in 1971 with just a handful of dancers in colorful, authentic Bavarian costumes. The group is much larger now, and they perform for numerous festivals, Oktoberfests, parades, weddings and other events. There are around 75 such groups across the US. We are fortunate to have two of the Almenrausch Schuhplattlers dancers perform for us at the October 19 meeting.

The Russian Kaleidoscope consists of SFAC member Grigoriy Krumik on Bayan, Klark Welsh on balalaika and Vladimir Zagatsky singing tenor. In order to keep it to one page, we had to do some condensing. Note that the intro to the piece is written in bass clef—to be played with the left hand (very simple). The names of the notes are also provided.

The long note in the second line has only the names of the notes indicated, but they, too, are played in the left hand (also very simple).

The same notes as the introduction are repeated in the third line, indicated here by just the names of the notes. The same notes are repeated again in the last line, but notice that this line has both treble and bass clef—and this time the notes are written as notes in the bass clef.

Confusing? Not at all! Try it and you'll see how simple it is.



### Press Release

# from Ohio State University Medical Center

The pumping action of the human heart, and how it subsequently pushes blood throughout the body, is similar to how music is made by playing an accordion, according to clinicians at the Ohio State University Medical Center....

In addition to having the properties of a suction pump, the heart functions as a sort of twisting bellows pump that is similar to the accordion. . . . Continued study of a theory that the human heart mimics the action of an accordion will lead to improved medical and surgical therapies to address heart failure.

The accordion is able to generate the maximum intensity of

sound energy when it is most expanded before the musician compresses it to generate the sound. Similarly, the heart tends to generate the highest output when contracting from its most relaxed stated. When the heart is not maximally relaxed, it is more likely to generate lesser cardiac output, which could result in symptoms of heart failure.

This theory is based upon findings from animal studies where the investigations found an accordion-like thickening of the ventricular wall, resulting in reduced pumping effectiveness. Improved magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) resolution may allow investigators to identify ventricular wall thickening in the left ventricles of human hearts.

(Not sure I agree with all the assumptions about the accordion—Editor)
