First on the musical agenda, we had the pleasure of hearing from Alex Roitman, a student of Peter Di Bono. Alex started solo, playing a lovely piece called Mikor in Est Meselini Kezd ("Dreams of the Night," Hungarian Gypsy Waltz). Alex had great interpretation, and used his bellows beautifully. Although Alex has been taking lessons with Peter

for only 14 months, he plays

like a much more experienced accordionist. Alex does have a piano background, which surely helps, but he must have loads of talent and practiced hard to achieve the excep-

tional bass and bellow work that we heard.

Nev+, Alex played Monti's Czardas, and did a wonderful job on that

He was then joined by Peter Di Bono, and the two of them played *Indifférence*, with a second part composed by Steve Navoyoskey; and then a perky Polka composed and arranged for two accordions by Joe Smiell. Congratulations to both Peter and Alex for a fine performance.

Next up was **Don Nurisso's Trio**. Don is a well-known jazz accordionist who has been playing for years. He is a native San Franciscan who was taught by Dino Benetti, and he was joined today by **Marc Hinchman** on percussion and **Bob Rizzetto** on Bass. Bob also plays mandolin, and he and

Don both play with the Aurora Mandolin Orchestra.

Don's group gave us a great mix of well-known and lesser-known pieces, and Don's stylings were superb. We've never

heard Don play better, and that's saying something!

They started the set with a jazz waltz, Alice in Wonderland, by Sammy Paine.

Next up was a set by

Steve Allen, the *Gravy Waltz*, and a lovely ballad that was new to me, *Impossible*. They continued with a great rendition of Cole Porter's *Begin the Beguine* and a wonderful Antonio Carlos Jobim piece, *Jazz N' Samba*.

Back into lesser-known territory with Dansero by Richard Hayman, and then on to a saucy piece by the legendary Charlie Parker, My Little Suede Shoes. Next, the trio featured their drummer, Marc, on Cute, with lots of surprising stops and starts that really kept our attention; and then the spotlight was on bassist Bob Rizzetto, who sang Do you Know What it Means to Miss New Orleans? Bob had some great reminiscences about playing with Peter and Don, and Charlie Kreider, a drummer who could not and would not allow unplanned changes in tempo. The encore was Satin Doll by Ellington, and a fine time was had by all. Wow, what a great set!

After the break with its wonderful goodies by Tuti, and the raffle, the music program continued with The Klezmakers. We had a brief introduction to Klezmer music before we heard SFAC member Bruce Kirschner and the Klezmakers. What a show! We were educated, entertained, and privileged to hear this large group of outstanding musicians. To see them at upcoming performances, please check their Website at

Member Bruce Kirschner was featured on accordion, and he was joined by Tom Belick on Clarinet; Kurt Conrad on Bass; Daphna Rahmil on Violin; Rachel Garb on Piccolo and Percussion; Larry Yelowitz on keyboards; Alan Rappoport on quitar; and Elaine Moise on vocals and percussion.

The set started with Kamen 1 & 2 freylekhs, "freylekhs" being the Yiddish word for joyful, and it certainly was. Next was a doyne, a contemplative and emotional piece leading directly into Der Shtiller, another freylekh. Elaine Moise guided us through the intricacies of the history and forms of Klezmer music with her introductions to the pieces, and she began her vocals with a well-known piece, Tum Balalaika, with a 3/4 rhythm.

Bruce Kirschner on accordion was featured on the next piece, Kolomeika: and then we heard Der Heyser Bulgar. Elaine was back to tell us the story of Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen, which she sang in both Yiddish and English, and then we had Broyges Tanz, a piece about two mothers-in-law at a wedding who view each other with suspicion, and then end up with reconciliation. We heard a lively piece, Tantz, Tantz, which means "Dance, Dance" and which featured each player individually. They all had a chance to play some fun licks

from various well-known pieces, and the audience really responded. Then Elaine was back on vocals with *Oy Mame*, about a young girl so in love with a Klezmer player. Elaine composed the next piece in honor of her 10-year-old son, Daniel, who has plenty of energy, called *Daniel's Tantz*. All the pieces were full of such interesting rhythmic patterns.

Next up was Kolomeika 20, a rhythmic dance that had the audience clapping, and then we heard a plaintive and lovely lullaby, Raisins and Almonds, about a widow mother singing her boy to sleep. The Arabian influence was on display in Araber Tantz, and then we were treated to Alex's 1, a piece written by a friend of the band, Alex Eulenberg.

For an encore, they played *Terk in Amerika*, based on Turkish melodies. What a terrific afternoon. The Klezmakers appreciated the attentive audience, and we appreciated a rare musical treat!






A Piece of History is Restored

by Vince Cirelli and Bob Berta

Master craftsman and club member, Vince Cirelli was given the opportunity to restore a remarkable bit of history. It is Pietro Dicro's Guerrini accordion. The process has started and we were able to inspect the disassembled accordion and found some faccinating bits and pieces. Inside the accordion Pietro wrote his name, in addition we find the names of the makers of the accordion. Piatanesi (Gordon's grandfather)

plated brass. The black keys are made of ebony wood as are some beautiful carved scrolls at each end of the treble keyboard. The accordion was found by the late Jullio Giulietti in a pawn shop. 


